

From Karlsplatz take Underground U2 (direction Schottentor) to station Rathaus. Proceed to street 'Josefstädter Straße' and walk three blocks. Turn right into Piaristengasse (see solid line in picture).

What to do in Vienna

Sightseeing

Visitors have no problems finding their way around Vienna. The medieval centre forms the heart of the city: officially the *first district*. Any sightseeing tour should begin in this historical 2-sq-km city centre. Ideally, you should go on foot, as the streets are largely traffic free.



The city centre is circled by Ring Boulevard which is 4 kilometres long. The magnificent architecture of Ring Boulevard

can also be viewed from the No. 1 or 2 trams; one going clockwise, the other counter clockwise. *Ring Boulevard* was constructed 1857. The magnificent road was erected on free space, which emerged after tearing down the former city walls, glacis, and military enforcements protecting the city centre, today's first district ('Innere Stadt'). Ring boulevard was generously planned, leaving sufficient space for a shaded avenue and monumental buildings like Hofburg, Austrian Parliament, State Opera House, Museum of Fine Arts, the first public astronomical observatory Urania, and Vienna university among others.

Museums

The Albertina Graphic Arts Collection is the largest and most important graphic collection in the world. It owns about 60.000 drawings and about a million graphic reproductions, like Albrecht Dürer's famous "Rabbit" (1502). You



will find works by Leonardo da Vinci, Michelangelo Buonarroti, Rembrandt van Rijn, Peter Paul

Rubens, Eugène Delacroix, Edouard Manet and Paul Cézanne. 20th century Austrian artists like Egon Schiele, Gustav Klimt or Oskar Kokoschka. Location: first district, Albertinaplatz 1.

At Vienna's Museum of Fine Arts you will admire paintings by Rubens, Rembrandt, Vermeer, Dürer, Raphael, Tiziano and Velásquez, as well as the most comprehensive collection of Bruegel's paintings in the



world. Location: first district, Maria-Theresien-Platz.
